# Are young people equipped to deal with loneliness? 06th - 13th May 2022

To mark this year's Mental Health Awareness Week, our voters discussed the theme of loneliness and its links to our wellbeing. The lessons gave them insight into the facts behind the "loneliness epidemic" in the UK, as well as allowing them to consider what they could do to tackle the issue in their own lives.

Primary voters decided: "Are you comfortable talking about loneliness?", while our Secondary & College voters discussed: "Are young people equipped to deal with loneliness?"

So far, 32,040 young people in the UK took part in this vote.





"Some things that we do to help us with loneliness is visit our siblings, facetime each other, call our mums, hang out with my little brothers, walking the dog, listening to music, practice a hobby. And sometimes it's ok to be lonely and experience your feelings."

"Not equipped or prepared for it but learn to deal with it. I don't think there's a specific way to 'prepare' or 'equip' for loneliness but having support for young people is very important when suffering with loneliness."

"Even though talking to an adult helps us, keeping our feelings inside can be OK. Loneliness comes and goes, like in the Pandemic. If you are lonely, it is ok to talk about it. It's ok to feel lonely."
